REQUESTED ACTION

Authorize the Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Public Health Services, to enter into a **Sole Source** amendment to an existing contract with New Hampshire Children's Trust, Inc. (VC# 218449), Concord, NH, to expand Family Resource Center infrastructure that helps New Hampshire families through a variety of programs by increasing the price limitation by \$2,625,000 from \$10,579,647 to \$13,204,647, with no change to the completion date of June 30, 2024, effective upon Governor and Council approval. 61.9% Federal Funds. 38.1% General Funds.

The original contract was approved by Governor and Council on June 30, 2021, item #41, amended on October 13, 2021, item #20, on April 6, 2022, item #8, on January 18, 2023, item #19, and most recently on June 28, 2023, item #24.

Funds are available in the following accounts for State Fiscal Year 2024, with the authority to adjust budget line items within the price limitation and encumbrances between state fiscal years through the Budget Office, if needed and justified.

EXPLANATION

This request is **Sole Source** because MOP 150 requires all amendments to agreements previously approved as sole source to be identified as sole source and the Department is adding additional funding. The Contractor is uniquely qualified to provide statewide support and effectively apply evidence-based standards and services to New Hampshire's network of Family Resource Centers with the goal of strengthening families statewide. Additionally, this amendment adds funding from House Bill 2 (2023) to support the infrastructure for the statewide network of Family Resource Centers.

The purpose of this request is to add State Fiscal Year 2024 funding to allow for the Contractor to continue to support the infrastructure for the statewide network of Family Resource Centers. Additionally, this amendment adds funding to support marketing and outreach for child care initiatives, resources, child care scholarships, and the Early Childhood Regional System.

The additional funding supports:

- 1. Enhancing Family Resource Centers by supporting the infrastructure of the Family Resource Centers, Family Resource Center of Quality designation efforts, providing staff training, fostering improved collaboration with other early childhood systems, and sustaining evidence-based initiatives and community partnerships.
- Strengthening marketing and outreach to the eligible population and providers on topics including resource and referral services, the NH Child Care Scholarship program, workforce initiatives, childcare supply, and quality enhancement. This includes hosting and maintaining the consumer education website, NH Connections.
- Supporting seven Early Childhood Regional Systems by providing infrastructure and technical assistance across key early childhood regional partners, family support programs, Community Collaborations agencies, and key State partners. The Contractor will support and provide ongoing capacity building, coordination, communication, performance management, and evaluation.

Approximately 6,400 families statewide will continue to be served annually through the Family Resource Centers supported through this amendment.

In addition to the families being served, approximately 75 additional community-based agencies will be served annually with training.

The Department will monitor services by:

- Reviewing the process and outcome measures identified in the quarterly reports submitted by the Contractor;
- Meeting with the Contractor monthly to ensure compliance with contractual requirements; and
- Reviewing expenditures and conducting data quality assurance activities on a monthly basis.

Should the Governor and Council not authorize this request, the Department will be unable to expand existing services, as well as marketing and messaging services, which contribute to the development of healthy families and healthy communities.

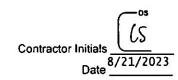

Notes to Financial Statements For the Year Ended December 31, 2022

1. Organization

Vision for New Hampshire – We envision a New Hampshire where all children grow up free from abuse and neglect.

Mission – We lead the drive to ensure safe, stable, and nurturing relationships and environments for children by educating, advocating, and collaborating.

New Hampshire Children's Trust, Inc. (the Organization) is mandated as the Governor's Designated Statewide Prevention Agency under Community-Based Child Abuse Prevention (CBCAP) as the New Hampshire chapter of Prevent Child Abuse America (PCAA), and as a member of the National Alliance of Children's Trust and Prevention Funds (the Alliance). Founded in 1986 as the New Hampshire Children's Trust Fund, a quasi-governmental organization, the agency transitioned to New Hampshire Children's Trust, Inc., a 501(c)(3) nonprofit corporation, in 2011.

The Organization impacts the lives of children and families through the following programs:

Family Strengthening and Support - Investments in primary prevention are essential to building a New Hampshire where children grow up free from abuse and neglect, and where all families have access to comprehensive and responsive supports, so they are healthy, learning, and thriving now and in the future. The Organization operationalizes this strategy by providing comprehensive supports and services to mission-driven organizations. As New Hampshire's Family Resource Center Facilitation Organization & Quality Specialist (FO), the Organization coordinates resources and public awareness activities, and provides training and technical assistance for the implementation of operational quality control standards for Family Resource Centers (FRC) statewide to standardize practices and service delivery across programs. The Organization developed, implemented, and oversees New Hampshire's Kinship Navigation Program, which provides formal supports and services to kinship families statewide. Additionally, the Organization developed, implemented, and manages New Hampshire's Family Support Data System (FSDS), a common platform for agencies to track and report on program data and family outcomes. Data derived from FSDS is used to inform actions and service delivery. The Organization adheres to the Strengthening Families Framework and the Essentials for Childhood Framework to create the context for healthy children and

families through programs, policy, and social norms change with the ultimate goal being increased opportunities for *all* New Hampshire children and families.

• Community Education and Advocacy - This strategy focuses on the community and society domains of public health social ecological framework. Informed by the latest research, best practices, and emerging best practices in child abuse and neglect prevention, it provides education and support to elected officials; community, faith and business leaders; parents; providers; and concerned citizens. It includes public education and awareness campaigns such as BE PREVENTION, Kinship Navigation, Family Support NH, and creates pathways for participant engagement through activity books and other materials so children can thrive in safe, stable, and nurturing environments.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The following is a summary of significant accounting policies used in preparing and presenting the accompanying financial statements.

Basis of Financial Statement Presentation

The financial statements of the Organization have been prepared on the accrual basis in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAP).

Change in Accounting Principle

ASU 2016-02, Leases

Effective January 1, 2022, the Organization adopted Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) 842, Leases. The Organization determines if an arrangement contains a lease at inception based on whether the Organization has the right to control the asset during the contract period and other facts and circumstances. The Organization elected the package of practical expedients permitted under the transition guidance within the new standard, which among other things, allowed it to carry forward the historical lease classification. The Organization elected the short-term lease recognition exemption for all leases that qualify. Consequently, for those leases that qualify, the Organization will not recognize right-of-use assets or lease liabilities on the Statement of Financial Position. The Organization generally does not have access to the rate implicit in the lease and, therefore, the Organization utilizes the risk-free rate as the discount rate.

The adoption of ASC 842 resulted in the recognition of a right-to-use asset and an operating lease liability as of January 1, 2022. Results for periods beginning prior to January 1, 2022 continue to be reported in accordance with the Organization's historical accounting treatment. The adoption of ASC 842 did not have a material impact on the Organization's results of operations and cash flows.

See Summary of Significant Account Policies, Leases, for further discussion of the effects of adopting ASC 842 on the Organization's significant account policies.

ASU 2020-07, Contributed Nonfinancial Assets

In 2022, the Organization retrospectively adopted Accounting Standards Update (ASU) 2020-07, Not-for-Profit Entities (Topic 958): Presentation and Disclosures by Not-for-Profit Entities for Contributed Nonfinancial Assets. The new guidance requires nonprofit entities to present contributed nonfinancial assets as a separate line item in the Statement of Activities, apart from contributions of cash or other financial assets. The standard also increases the disclosure requirements around contributed nonfinancial assets, including disaggregating by category the types of contributed nonfinancial assets a nonprofit entity has received. Adoption of this standard did not have a significant impact on the financial statements, with the exception of increased disclosure.

Comparative Financial Information

The accompanying financial statements include certain prior-year summarized comparative information in total, but not by net asset class. Such information does not include sufficient detail to constitute a presentation in conformity with GAAP. Accordingly, such information should be read in conjunction with the audited financial statements for the year ended December 31, 2021, from which the summarized information was derived.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

All cash and highly liquid financial instruments with original maturities of three months or less, and which are neither held for nor restricted by donors for long-term purposes, are considered to be cash and cash equivalents.

Accounts Receivable

Accounts receivable consist primarily of noninterest-bearing amounts due for services and programs. The adequacy of the allowance for doubtful accounts for receivables is reviewed on an ongoing basis by the Organization's management and adjusted as required through the provision for doubtful accounts (bad debt expense). Management has determined that no allowance is necessary.

Contributions Receivable

Unconditional contributions that are expected to be collected within one year are recorded at net realizable value. Unconditional contributions that are expected to be collected in future years are initially recorded at fair value using present value techniques incorporating risk-adjusted discount rates designed to reflect the assumptions market participants would use in pricing the asset. In subsequent years, amortization of the discounts is included in contribution revenue in the Statement of Activities. The allowance for uncollectable contributions is based on historical experience, an assessment of economic conditions, and a review of subsequent

collections. Contributions are written off when deemed uncollectable. Management has determined that no allowance is necessary.

Grants Receivable

Grants receivable, that is, those with a measurable performance or other barrier, and a right of return, are not recognized until the conditions on which they depend have been substantially met. Amounts recorded as grants receivable represent cost-reimbursable contracts and grants, which the incurrence of allowable qualifying expenses and/or the performance of certain requirements have been met or performed. The allowance for uncollectible grants receivable is based on historical experience and a review of subsequent collections. Management has determined that no allowance is necessary.

Property and Equipment

Property and equipment additions over \$2,500 are recorded at cost, if purchased, and at fair value at the date of donation, if donated. Depreciation is computed using the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the assets ranging from 3 to 7 years. When assets are sold or otherwise disposed of, the cost and related depreciation is removed, and any resulting gain or loss is included in the Statement of Activities. Costs of maintenance and repairs that do not improve or extend the useful lives of the respective assets are expensed.

The carrying values of property and equipment are reviewed for impairment whenever events or circumstances indicate that the carrying value of an asset may not be recoverable from the estimated future cash flows expected to result from its use and eventual disposition. When considered impaired, an impairment loss is recognized to the extent carrying value exceeds the fair value of the asset. There were no indicators of asset impairment in 2022 or 2021.

Beneficial Interest Held in Trust

The Organization is the beneficiary of an agency endowment fund held at the New Hampshire Charitable Foundation. The beneficial interest in the trust is reported at its fair value, which is estimated as the fair value of the underlying trust assets. Distributions of income from the trust assets are to be used to plan and initiate programs to prevent child abuse and neglect. The value of the beneficial interest in the trust is adjusted annually for the change in its estimated fair value. Those changes in value are reported as changes in net assets with donor restrictions. The assets in the trust will never be distributed to the Organization.

Leases

The Organization determines if an arrangement is a lease, or contains a lease, at inception of a contract and when the terms of an existing contract are changed. The Organization recognizes a lease liability and a right-of-use (ROU) asset at the commencement date of the lease. The lease liability is initially and subsequently recognized based on the present value of its future lease payments. Variable payments

are included in the future lease payments when those variable payments depend on an index or a rate. The Organization generally does not have access to the rate implicit in the lease and, therefore, the Organization utilizes a risk-free rate as the discount rate at the lease commencement date for all classes of underlying assets. The ROU asset is subsequently measured throughout the lease term at the amount of the remeasured lease liability (i.e., present value of the remaining lease payments), plus unamortized initial direct costs, plus (minus) any prepaid (accrued) lease payments, less the unamortized balance of lease incentives received, and any impairment recognized. Lease cost for lease payments is recognized on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

The Organization has elected, for all underlying classes of assets, to not recognize ROU assets and lease liabilities for short-term leases that have a lease term of 12 months or less at lease commencement, and do not include an option to purchase the underlying asset that the Organization is reasonably certain to exercise. The Organization recognizes lease costs associated with short-term leases on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

The Organization has lease agreements with lease and non-lease components, which are generally accounted for separately. The Organization has elected, for all underlying classes of assets, to account for each separate lease component of a contract and its associated non-lease components (repairs and maintenance) as a single lease component. For arrangements accounted for as a single lease component, there may be variability in future lease payments as the amount of the non-lease components is typically revised from one period to the next. These variable lease payments are recognized in operating expenses in the period in which the obligation for those payments was incurred.

Net Assets

Net Assets Without Donor Restrictions

Net assets available for use in general operations and not subject to donor (or certain grantor) imposed restrictions. The Board has designated, from net assets without donor restrictions, net assets for an operating reserve.

Net Assets With Donor Restrictions

Net assets subject to donor (or certain grantor) imposed restrictions. Some donor-imposed restrictions are temporary in nature, such as those that will be met by the passage of time or other events specified by the donor. Other donor-imposed restrictions are perpetual in nature, where the donor stipulates that resources be maintained in perpetuity. Donor-imposed restrictions are released when a restriction expires, that is, when the stipulated time has elapsed, when the stipulated purpose for which the resource was restricted has been fulfilled, or both. The Organization recognizes revenue from contributions and grants that were initially conditional, which became unconditional with restrictions during the reporting period, and for which those

restrictions were met during the reporting period, as net assets without donor restrictions.

Revenue and Revenue Recognition

The Organization recognizes contributions when cash, securities, or other assets, an unconditional promise to give, or a notification of a beneficial interest is received. Conditional promises to give, that is, those with a measurable performance or other barrier, and a right of return, are not recognized until the conditions on which they depend have been substantially met.

A portion of revenue is derived from cost-reimbursable contracts and grants, which are conditioned upon certain performance requirements and/or the incurrence of allowable qualifying expenses. Amounts received are recognized as revenue when the Organization has incurred expenditures in compliance with specific contract or grant provisions. Amounts received prior to incurring qualifying expenditures are reported as refundable advances in the Statement of Financial Position.

Revenue derived from providing program services is recognized as the services are provided. Program service fees paid in advance are deferred to the period to which they relate. Payment for trainings and conferences is required before the service is provided and is recorded as a contract liability until the performance obligation is met. Due to the nature and timing of the performance and/or transfer of services, certain contract liabilities at December 31 of each year are recognized in the following year.

Donated Services and In-Kind Contributions

Volunteers contribute significant amounts of time to program services, administration, and fundraising and development activities; however, the financial statements do not reflect the value of these contributed services because they do not meet recognition criteria prescribed by GAAP. GAAP allows recognition of contributed services only if (a) the services create or enhance nonfinancial assets, or (b) the services would have been purchased if not provided by contribution, require specialized skills, and are provided by individuals possessing those skills. Donated professional services are recorded at the respective fair value of the services received. Contributed goods are recorded at fair value at the date of donation and as expenses when placed in service or distributed. Donated use of facilities is reported as a contribution and as an expense at the estimated fair value of similar space for rent under similar conditions. If the use of the space is promised unconditionally for a period greater than one year, the amount is reported as a contribution and an unconditional promise to give at the date of the gift, and the expense is reported over the term of use.

Functional Allocation of Expenses

The costs of providing the Organization's various programs and activities have been summarized on a functional basis in the Statement of Activities. The Statement of Functional Expenses presents the natural classification detail of expenses by function.

Certain categories of expenses are attributed to more than one program or supporting function. Accordingly, certain costs have been allocated among the programs and supporting services benefited on a reasonable basis that is consistently applied. Expenses that relate solely to the functional categories are directly charged, however, there are certain expenses that are allocated. Expenses that are allocated include utilities, repairs and maintenance, depreciation, certain insurances, interest, salaries and wages, benefits, and payroll taxes, which are allocated based on time and effort estimates.

Measure of Operations

The Statement of Activities reports all changes in net assets, including changes in net assets from operating and nonoperating activities. Operating activities consist of those items attributable to the Organization's ongoing programs and services. Nonoperating activities are limited to resources outside of those programs and services and are comprised of non-recurring gains and losses on sales and dispositions, interest, and changes in the beneficial interest held in trust.

Income Taxes

The Organization has been recognized by the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) as exempt from federal income taxes under Internal Revenue Code (IRC) Section 501(a) as an organization described in IRC Section 501(c)(3), qualifies for charitable contribution deductions, and has been determined not to be a private foundation. The Organization is annually required to file a Return of Organization Exempt from Income Tax (Form 990) with the IRS. In addition, the Organization is subject to income tax on net income that is derived from business activities that are unrelated to its exempt purpose.

Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with GAAP requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements, and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results may differ from those estimates.

Financial Instruments and Credit Risk

Deposit concentration risk is managed by placing cash and money market accounts with financial institutions believed to be creditworthy. The Organization carefully manages its bank accounts and monitors deposits to ensure insurance limits are not exceeded. To date, no losses have been experienced in any of these accounts. Credit risk associated with receivables is considered to be limited due to high historical collection rates.

Fair Value Measurements

Certain assets and liabilities are reported at fair value in the financial statements. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction in the principal, or most advantageous, market at the measurement date under current market conditions regardless of whether that price is

directly observable or estimated using another valuation technique. Inputs used to determine fair value refer broadly to the assumptions that market participants would use in pricing the asset or liability, including assumptions about risk. Inputs may be observable or unobservable. Observable inputs are inputs that reflect the assumptions market participants would use in pricing the asset or liability based on market data obtained from sources independent of the reporting entity. Unobservable inputs are inputs that reflect the reporting entity's own assumptions about the assumptions market participants would use in pricing the asset or liability based on the best information available. A three-tier hierarchy categorizes the inputs as follows:

- Level 1 Quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical assets or liabilities that are accessible at the measurement date.
- Level 2 Inputs other than quoted prices included within Level 1 that are observable
 for the asset or liability, either directly or indirectly. These include quoted prices for
 similar assets or liabilities in active markets, quoted prices for identical or similar
 assets or liabilities in markets that are not active, inputs other than quoted prices
 that are observable for the asset or liability, and market-corroborated inputs.
- Level 3 Unobservable inputs for the asset or liability. In these situations, inputs are developed using the best information available in the circumstances.

In some cases, the inputs used to measure the fair value of an asset or a liability might be categorized within different levels of the fair value hierarchy. In those cases, the fair value measurement is categorized in its entirety at the same level of the fair value hierarchy as the lowest level input that is significant to the entire measurement. Assessing the significance of a particular input to entire measurement requires judgment, taking into account factors specific to the asset or liability. The categorization of an asset or liability within the hierarchy is based upon the pricing transparency of the asset or liability and does not necessarily correspond to the assessment of the quality, risk, or liquidity profile of the asset or liability.

New Accounting Standards to be Adopted in the Future

Credit Losses

In June 2016, the FASB issued ASU 2016-13, Measurement of Credit Losses on Financial Instruments. The ASU requires a financial asset (including trade receivables) measured at amortized cost basis to be presented at the net amount expected to be collected. Thus, the Statement of Activities will reflect the measurement of credit losses for newly recognized financial assets, as well as the expected increases or decreases of expected credit losses that have taken place during the period. This ASU will be effective for the Organization for the year ending December 31, 2023. The Organization is currently in the process of evaluating the impact of adoption of this ASU on the financial statements.

3. Liquidity and Availability

Financial assets available for general expenditure, that is, without donor or other restrictions limiting their use, within one year of the date of the Statement of Financial Position, were comprised of the following at December 31, 2022 and 2021:

Time and purpose restricted net assets, included in net assets with donor restrictions, are expected to be met in less than one year and, therefore, are available for spending.

The Organization regularly monitors liquidity required to meet it's operating needs and other contractual commitments, while also striving to maximize the investment of its available funds. In addition to financial assets available to meet general expenditures over the next year, the Organization operates with a balanced budget and anticipates collecting sufficient revenue to cover general expenditures not covered by donor-restricted resources.

4. Loan Receivable

In 2016, the Organization entered into a one-year, unsecured \$10,000 loan agreement with the New Hampshire Community Loan Fund (the Fund). The Organization has renewed the loan agreement annually and the loan has a current maturity date of

June 30, 2024. Interest is compounded annually at a rate of 1% per annum. The Fund is a nonprofit voluntary corporation that provides services to lower income households and disadvantaged people in the form of housing, educational resources, and financing for community-based development projects. The Organization believes the Fund directly implements the Center for the Study of Social Policy's Strengthening Families' Protective Factors by providing concrete supports to these families in times of need and increasing their social connections. Through the Fund's financial support of other community organizations, it also helps indirectly with the implementation of the Strengthening Families Framework last two Protective Factors: Parental Resilience, Knowledge of Parenting and Child Development, and Social and Emotional Competence of Children.

As discussed in Note 2, the Organization is required to report its fair value measurements in one of three levels, which are based on the ability to observe in the marketplace the inputs to the Organization's valuation techniques. Level 3 is for assets measured using inputs that are unobservable, and is used in situations for which there is little, if any, market activity for the asset. Using Level 3 valuation techniques, the estimated fair value of the loan receivable at December 31, 2022 and 2021 has been determined to be \$10,302 and \$10,302, respectively.

6. Beneficial Interest Held in Trust

The Organization is the beneficiary of an agency endowment fund created by New Hampshire RSA 169-C:39-c and held at the New Hampshire Charitable Foundation (the Foundation). Pursuant to the terms of the resolution establishing this fund, property contributed to the Foundation is held as a separate fund specifically for the benefit of

the Organization. A second agency endowment fund, the Lucy Fowlkes Breed Legacy Fund, was created in 2010. In accordance with its spending policy, the Foundation makes distributions from these funds to the Organization.

The beneficial interest held in trust is reported at its fair value, which is estimated as the fair value of the underlying trust assets. As discussed in Note 2, because there are no observable market transactions for assets similar to the beneficial interest held in trust, the valuation technique used by the Organization is a Level 3 fair value measure.

7. Accrued Expenses

Accrued expenses at December 31, 2022 and 2021 consisted primarily of accrued salaries and accrued earned time.

8. Refundable Advances and Grants

The Organization receives grants, which are conditioned upon certain performance requirements and/or the incurrence of allowable qualifying expenditures. Amounts received prior to incurring qualifying expenditures are reported as refundable advances. At December 31, 2022 and 2021, \$733,093 and \$726,000, respectively, were reflected as refundable advances.

The Organization was awarded federal Community-Based Child Abuse Prevention (CBCAP) grants from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. These funds are from the Child Abuse Prevention and Treatment Act Title II program and are allocated to states on a per child formula. Since 1996, the Governor of New Hampshire has designated New Hampshire Children's Trust, Inc. as the State Lead Agency eligible to apply for and receive these funds. The CBCAP funds are used to strengthen and improve prevention programs and activities. Whereas CBCAP is a cost-reimbursable grant,

\$307,862 and \$368,778 have not been recognized at December 31, 2022 and 2021, respectively, because qualifying expenditures have not yet been incurred.

In June 2019, the Organization was awarded a grant with the State of New Hampshire Department of Health and Human Services to provide Family Resource Center (FRC) facilitation and organization services in an amount not to exceed \$1,004,646 and with a completion date of June 30, 2021. In December 2019, the grant was amended to increase the funding to \$3,021,874, retroactive to October 1, 2019 with no change to the completion date. Under this grant, the Organization provides coordination, support, training, and technical assistance for the implementation of operational and quality control standards for all FRC's statewide in order to increase the number of FRC's receiving the Family Resource Center of Quality (FRC-Q) designation and standardize FRC and FRC-Q delivery of services. The Organization also provides support to kinship caregivers who are caring for family members because of the placement by the Division of Children, Youth, and Families (DCYF). In July 2021, the Organization was awarded a second grant in an amount not to exceed \$2,533,600 and with a completion date of June 30, 2023. Whereas these are cost-reimbursable grants, \$1,395,574 and \$2,084,904 have not been recognized at December 31, 2022 and 2021, respectively, because qualifying expenditures have not yet been incurred.

Grant revenue from federal agencies is subject to independent audit under the Office of Management and Budget's Uniform Grant Guidance, and review by grantor agencies. The review could result in the disallowance of expenditures under the terms of the grant or reductions of future grant funds. Based on prior experience, the Organization's management believes that costs ultimately disallowed, if any, would not materially affect the financial position of the Organization.

9. Contract Liabilities

Upon receipt of a prepayment for services, the Organization recognizes a contract liability in the amount of the prepayment for its performance obligation to transfer goods and services in the future. At December 31, 2022 and 2021, the Organization has recorded contract liabilities of \$179,340 and \$123,428, respectively. These amounts will be recognized as revenue when the Organization transfers goods and services and, therefore, satisfies its performance obligations.

10. Line of Credit

The Organization has a line of credit with a bank that is secured by all assets of the Organization. Maximum borrowing on the line is \$300,000. The line is payable on demand, with regular monthly payments of all accrued unpaid interest. Interest is variable based upon changes in an independent index, which is the highest Wall Street Journal Prime Rate, and is calculated using a rate of 1.5% over the index. At December 31, 2022 and 2021, the Organization had no outstanding balance on the line of credit and did not draw on the line during 2022 or 2021.

11. Leases

As discussed in Note 2, the Organization adopted ASC 842 as of January 1, 2022, which resulted in the recognition of a right-to-use asset and an operating lease liability of \$66,190 for its office space. During 2022, this lease expired and a new lease was entered into in October 2022 for office space at a new location. Under this non-cancelable operating lease agreement, monthly payments range from \$4,500 to \$5,070. The lease expires on September 30, 2027, with an option to extend for an additional 5 year period. As of December 31, 2022, the Organization is not reasonably certain it will exercise the extension option.

While agreement provides minimum lease payments, it includes payments adjusted for inflation or variable common area maintenance charges. Variable payments are not determinable at the lease commencement and are not included in the measurement of lease assets and liabilities. The lease agreement does not include any material residual value guarantees or restrictive covenants.

12. Net Assets

Board-Designated Net Assets

Board-designated net assets have been established to 1) meet the Organization's operational demands given its uneven annual cash flow cycle; 2) be prepared for managing uncertainties associated with federal funding; and 3) be positioned to take advantage of opportunities for new initiatives and program expansion. Board policy states that any interim use of these funds, when used to assist with the Organization's cash flow, should be replaced within sixty days. The balance of board-designated net assets at December 31, 2022 and 2021 was \$524,380 and \$524,380, respectively.

14. Retirement Plan

The Organization participates in a tax-deferred annuity plan qualified under Section 403(b) of the Internal Revenue Code. The plan covers full-time employees of the Organization who have worked at least 1,000 hours during the 12-month period immediately following the date of hire. Employees may make contributions to the plan up to the maximum amount allowed by the Internal Revenue Code. Contributions made to the plan by the Organization for the years ended December 31, 2022 and 2021 totaled \$47,103 and \$43,696, respectively.

15. Designated Funds with New Hampshire Charitable Foundation

The Organization is the beneficiary of three designated funds held at the New Hampshire Charitable Foundation (the Foundation). Under these agreements, amounts that are donor designated for this purpose are transferred permanently to the Foundation. In accordance with FASB ASC 958-605-25, amounts received for the endowment fund are not recorded as income and are not included as assets in these financial statements. Rather, the contributions are recorded as assets and as income of the Foundation. The fair market value of these endowment funds was as follows at December 31, 2022 and 2021:

In accordance with its spending policy, the Foundation makes distributions from the funds to the Organization to offset its supporting services expenses. Total distributions received were \$46,266 and \$48,420 for the years ended December 31, 2022 and 2021, respectively.

16. Concentration of Risk

A material part of the Organization's revenue is dependent upon government sources, the loss of which would have a materially adverse effect on the Organization. During the years ended December 31, 2022 and 2021, federal grants and contracts accounted for 74.8% and 87.2%, respectively, of total operating revenues.

17. Agency Agreement with New Hampshire Division for Children, Youth, and Families

The Organization acts as an agent on behalf of the New Hampshire Division for Children, Youth, and Families (DCYF), where the Organization purchases goods or pays for services when authorized and requested by DCYF. These requests are referred to as "flex fund" requests and DCYF reimburses the Organization for the purchases or payments. DCYF determines the families that are eligible to receive the goods or services. Whereas the Organization is acting in a fiscal agent capacity, the activity under this agreement is not recorded as revenues and expenses, in accordance with GAAP. Total activity in 2022 and 2021 amounted to \$0 and \$14,493, respectively.

18. Subsequent Events

Subsequent events have been evaluated through June 12, 2023, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

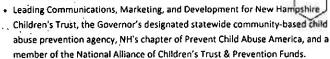

Authorize the Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Economic Stability, to enter into a **Sole Source** amendment to an existing contract with New Hampshire Children's Trust, Inc. (VC# 218449), Concord, NH to revise the scope of work to expand the ongoing support of Family Resource Centers across the state to achieve the "Family Resource Center of Quality" designation of national standards, sustain kinship navigation and Community Collaborations, facilitate coordination of Family Resource Centers and the Early Childhood Regional System, and expand upon marketing for child care scholarship assistance by increasing the price limitation by \$2,854,760 from \$7,724,887 to \$10,579,647, with no change to the completion date of June 30, 2024, effective July 1, 2023, upon Governor and Council approval. 48.16% Federal Funds. 51.84% General Funds.

The original contract was approved by Governor and Council on June 30, 2021, item #41, amended on October 13, 2021, item #20, on April 6, 2022, item #8, and most recently on January 18, 2023, item #19.

Funds are anticipated to be available in State Fiscal Year 2024, upon the availability and continued appropriation of funds in the future operating budget, with the authority to adjust budget line items within the price limitation and encumbrances between state fiscal years through the Budget Office, if needed and justified.

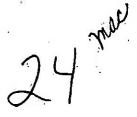
EXPLANATION

This request is Sole Source because MOP 150 requires all amendments to agreements previously approved as sole source to be identified as sole source and the Department is adding additional funding and revising the scope of work. The Contractor is uniquely qualified to provide statewide support and effectively apply evidence-based standards and services to NH's network of Family Resource Centers with the goal of strengthening families statewide.

The purpose of this request is for the Contractor to expand the infrastructure and support for the statewide network of Family Resource Centers.

This request includes:

- Family Resource Centers. Additional funds will support Family Resource Center infrastructure, Family Resource Center of Quality designation efforts, and staff training. Additional funds will support two (2) existing services at the Family Resource Centers: the Kinship Navigation Program and Community Collaborations.
- 2. Kinship Navigation. Additional funds will sustain the management and implementation of Kinship Navigation programs in Family Resource Centers through State Fiscal Year 2024.

Services are focused on providing resource and economic connections and support to kinship care families. There are currently 1,070 individuals receiving services through the Kinship Navigation program statewide.

- 3. Community Collaborations. Additional funds will sustain cross-sector Community Implementation Teams that connect families to the services they need to support self-sufficiency and economic stability in targeted communities. Services are focused on providing resource connections to families with young children and creating system-level changes designed to help reduce child maltreatment and the risk of children entering foster care.
- 4. Expand the Contractor's scope of work to increase marketing and outreach and training opportunities that supports access to resources for families, child care providers, employers, and other stakeholders. This includes hosting and maintaining the consumer education website, NH Connections, as a source of information dissemination. Marketing and outreach efforts will increase stakeholder awareness and utilization of resource and referral services, NH Child Care Scholarship program; initiatives for workforce, child care supply, and quality improvement.
- 5. Expand the Contractor's scope of work to provide infrastructure and technical assistance support to the seven Early Childhood Regional System leads. The Early Childhood Regional System collaborates and coordinates across key early childhood regional partners, including Family Resource Centers, family support programs, Community Collaborations agencies and the Departments of Health and Human Services and Education. The Contractor will support and provide ongoing capacity building, coordination, communication, performance management, and evaluation.

Approximately 8,700 families will be supported through this amendment:

- 6,400 families will continued to be served annually through the Family Resource Centers;
- Approximately 250 additional families will be served annually through Kinship Navigation; and
- Approximately 200 additional families will be served annually through the work of Community Collaborations targeted communities.

In addition to the families being served, approximately 75 additional community-based agencies will be served annually with training.

Should the Governor and Council not authorize this request, the Department will be unable to sustain the management and implementation of the services delivered to families directly and that prevent child maltreatment, including Kinship Navigation; support for the Family Resource Center infrastructure, staff training, Early Childhood Regional System support to enhance coordination of early childhood systems, and Family Resource Center of Quality designation efforts; and expand marketing and messaging about key family programs, including

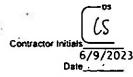

REQUESTED ACTION

Authorize the Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Economic and Housing Stability, to enter into a **Sole Source** amendment to an existing contract with New Hampshire Children's Trust, Inc. (VC #218449), Concord, NH for the ongoing support of Family Resource Centers (FRCs) across the state to receive the "Family Resource Center of Quality" (FRC-Q) designation to achieve national standards, assist youth and families involved with the Juvenile Justice system, further support the Kinship Navigator Program, provide training to community-based providers of family support services, and to continue addressing health disparities across the state by exercising a contract renewal option by increasing the price limitation by \$2,991,422 from \$4,733,465 to \$7,724,887, and extending the completion date from June 30, 2023 to June 30, 2024, effective upon Governor and Council approval, 52,36% Federal Funds, 47,64% General Funds.

The original contract was approved by Governor and Council on June 30, 2021, item #41, amended on October 13, 2021, item #20, and most recently amended on April 6, 2022, item #8.

Funds are available in the following accounts for State Fiscal Year 2023, and are anticipated to be available in State Fiscal Years 2024, upon the availability and continued appropriation of funds in the future operating budget, with the authority to adjust budget line items within the price limitation and encumbrances between state fiscal years through the Budget Office, if needed and justified.

See attached fiscal details.

EXPLANATION

This request is Sole Source because MOP 150 requires all amendments to agreements previously approved as sole source to be identified as sole source. The Contractor is uniquely qualified to provide statewide support to FRCs because the Contractor has been working effectively applying evidence-based standards and services to kinship families with the goal of strengthening families statewide.

The purpose of this request is for the Contractor to continue to provide infrastructure and support for the statewide network of FRCs, including the Kinship Navigation Program, community-based training, and the Community Health Workers (CHW) staffing support, with additional funds appropriated within Senate Bill 444 (SB444) to support the services. In addition, this request will expand the scope of services to include Juvenile Justice Integration.

SB444 was signed into law by the Governor on June 17, 2022, effective July 1, 2022. SB444 was enacted to mitigate adverse childhood experiences and appropriated the sum of \$1,000,000 to the Department to provide continued support to the FRCs as services include work designed to mitigate adverse childhood experiences. This funding will allow the FRCs to better serve families, prepare for "Family Resource Center of Quality" (FRC-Q) designation, enhance coordination with early childhood systems such as Adverse Childhood Experiences Response Team, Community Collaborations and support evidence-based programs including homevisiting programs, and support the current critical work of the FRCs.

This request is also to expand the scope of service to include Juvenile Justice Integration and to add funding for three (3) existing services at the FRCs:

- 1. <u>Juvenile Justice Integration</u> will continue to advance the Department's Initiative to transform and improve the State's Juvenile Justice System by providing a private meeting space at each FRC, as a convenient location for the youth and their family; enabling the Juvenile Probation Parole Officers (JPPO) to meet and work with the youth and family to in a community-based setting. In this environment, the JPPO will work to engage with youth and families in a supportive and collaborative environment. At the initial point of contact with law enforcement, the JPPO will work with youth and their families to conduct a formal Child and Adolescent Needs and Strengths (CANS) assessment. This assessment provides law enforcement with recommendations regarding the level of intervention needed for youth and their families. The Department has determined the FRCs are supportive and convenient locations for youth and their families.
- 2. <u>Kinship Navigation</u> will expand case management and barrier resolution supports to families that are in a kinship relationship. The added funding will allow the Contractor to provide additional technical assistance, training and support for the ongoing program evaluation to ensure best practices as Kinship Navigator caseloads continue to increase statewide. There are currently 645 Kinship families participating in this program.
- Training to community-based providers in evidence-based services will be expanded statewide to providers of Comprehensive Family Support Services. Trainings includes Motivational Interviewing, Strengthening Families' Protective Factors and Standards of Quality.
- 4. Community Health Workers will continue to deliver comprehensive supports provided by FRCs and specifically address some of the economic and health impacts related to COVID-19. CHWs will provide resource identification and connections to mental health, health care, substance use disorder, economic supports, and food and nutrition programs for families.

Through this contract, the Contractor administers a data system used by all FRCs. This data platform is now supporting FRCs with consistent, statewide data collection and outcomes, enabling the Department to measure the positive impact of the services FRCs provides to support family strengthening and child well-being. The data platform provides several dashboards and reports; including periodic, performance metrics, demographic and disparities reports.

Approximately 8,252 families will be supported through this amendment;

- 6,400 families will continued to be served annually through the FRCs;
- Approximately 1,000 families will be served annually through Juvenile Justice Integration;

- Approximately 250 additional families will be served annually through Kinship Navigation; and
- Approximately 602 families will be served annually through the work of the CHWs.

. In addition to the families being served:

- Approximately 75 additional community-based agencies will be served annually with training; and
- Approximately 15 CHWs will continue to provide support under the Health Disparities Grant to the statewide network of FRCs.

As referenced in Exhibit A, Section 1., Revisions to Form P-37, General Provisions, 3.3; of the original agreement, the parties have the option to extend the agreement for up to four (4) additional years, contingent upon satisfactory delivery of services, available funding, agreement of the parties and Governor and Council approval. The Department is exercising its option to renew services for one (1) of the four (4) years available.

Should the Governor and Council not authorize this request the Department will be unable to expand the Kinship Navigator Program, train community-based providers and address health disparities due to COVID-19; The Juvenile Justice system will not have these supportive and convenient locations to meet with youth and their families. These services contribute to the development of healthy families, which contribute to the development of healthy communities.

The original contract was approved by Governor and Council on June 30, 2021, item #41 and most recently amended with Governor and Council approval on September 29, 2021, item #20.

Funds are available in the following accounts for State Fiscal Years 2022 and 2023, with the authority to adjust budget line items within the price limitation and encumbrances between state fiscal years through the Budget Office, if needed and justified.

EXPLANATION

For the past few years, there has been a declining rate of New Hampshire families utilizing the Child Care and Development Fund (CCDF) assistance, known as the Child Care Scholarship, demonstrating the need for a campaign to improve public awareness of the program and its benefits. The purpose of this request is to modify the scope of work of the contract to include the creation of a campaign to promote awareness of the availability of child care assistance through the CCDF Program. The campaign's target audience will include parents and caregivers of young children, child care centers (including those not currently accepting CCDF funding), community leaders and prospective recipients and stakeholders. The campaign will also include benchmarks and an evaluation to track an anticipated five percent (5%) increase in enrollment of eligible children, expansion of the number of child care providers accepting CCDF funds, and the number of child care slots paid, in part, with CCDF funds. Given the state's current workforce challenges and the increased cost of child care, the Department seeks to educate the community about the availability of CCDF assistance.

The purpose of this request is also to add funding for the Kinship Navigator program which provides case management and barrier resolution supports to families that are in a kinship relationship. The added funding will allow the Contractor to provide additional technical

assistance, training, and support for the ongoing program evaluation to ensure best practices as Kinship Navigator caseloads continue to increase statewide.

The Contractor will continue to:

- Support Family Resource Centers (FRC) with applying for, and acquiring, the Family Resource Center of Quality (FRC-Q) designation;
- · Ensure ongoing implementation of the Kinship Navigator Program; and
- Provide infrastructure and support for the statewide network of Family Resource Centers.

The Contractor will support the statewide network of fifteen (15) FRCs that will provide kinship navigation to approximately 500 families annually.

Should the Governor and Council not authorize this request, FRCs throughout the state will experience diminished benefits of effective, research-based frameworks, and will continue to experience underutilization of the Child Care and Development Fund program that helps strengthen families and increase access to resources available in their communities to further their well-being.

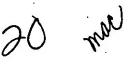

EXPLANATION

The purpose of this request is for the Department to expand the scope of work of the contract to increase Community Health worker staffing to meet the need for comprehensive supports provided by FRCs and to address COVID-19 Impacts affecting families. This expanded scope work is will address COVID-19 health disparities among populations at high risk and underserved, including racial and ethnic minority populations and rural communities. Through this amendment the contractor will expand the workforce of Community Health Workers (CHW) and embed them within the statewide network of FRCs to directly serve individuals and families impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic such as economic and health impacts.

CHWs will connect families to mental health, health care, substance use disorder, financial and budgeting supports, food and nutrition programs, COVID-19 testing, vaccination/immunization, and resource identification. Additionally the contract will expand data quality monitoring for additional family support programs such as the home visiting, Community Collaborations project (data to be collected includes economic needs, social needs, race, ethnicity, language, and access to technology and transportation). This will include enhanced communication strategies such as printing materials in additional languages and prioritizing engagement of families impacted by incarceration and families with young children in order to connect them timely to the services available through the FRCs that support positive outcomes.

The Department will continue working with the New Hampshire Children's Trust for its original contract scope to:

 - 2) implement the Kinship Navigator Program; and
 - 3) continue to provide infrastructure and support for the statewide network of FRCs.

The Contractor will work with the Wellness and Primary Prevention Council (established by the NH Legislature with a goal of creating a sustainable, quality system of Family Resource Centers across the state) and Family Support NH to assist FRCs to achieve standards of the National Family Support Network Quality for Family Strengthening and Support for the purpose of acquiring an FRC-Q designation, which includes:

- Providing FRCs with information and trainings on applicable standards and explaining how to acquire the FRC-Q designation;

The Contractor will continue to support system building and infrastructure development to support and assist Family Resource Centers (FRCs) statewide to provide programs that encompass evidence informed standards of family strengthening. Additionally, this contract will ensure primary prevention is provided through a system of qualified centers and will continue to build upon the investment that the State has made in the Resource Centers. The Contractor previously established evidence informed program and services to kinship families statewide. This program is invaluable to the nearly 12,000 eligible families in the state who are raising children of family members who have experienced and/or may be vulnerable to child maltreatment. Through this contract, the vendor administered a data system that all FRC's use. This data platform is now supporting FRCs with consistent, statewide r data collection and outcomes, enabling the Department to measure the positive impact of the FRC's and the services they provide for family strengthening and child well-being.

The purpose of this request is for the Contractor to 1) continue its support to the FRC's for Quality Designation 2) to implement the Kinship Navigator Program and 3) to continue to provide infrastructure and support the statewide network of FRC's. Through the FRC Quality Designation, the NHCT will perform individual assessments of the FRC's applying for the Family Resource Center of Quality (FRC-Q) designation, to identify, document deficiencies in meeting standards, support the correction of any deficiencies, and to assist each FRC throughout the application process.

The facilitated organziation will support FRCs statewide; currently there are fifteen (15) FRC's to will provide kindship navigation to approximately 1,000 families from July 1, 2021, to June 30, 2023.

The Contractor will work with the Wellness and Primary Prevention Council and Family Support NH to provide support to FRCs with implementing and meeting the National Family Support Network Quality for Family Strengthening and Support standards for the purpose of acquiring an FRC-Q designation, which includes:

- Providing FRCs with information about the standards: https://www.nationalfamilysupportnetwork.org/standards-of-quality;
- Providing technical support to FRCs in the implementation of standards;
- Providing technical support to FRCs in the implementation of procedures to document practice of standards;
- Providing training and technical assistance to FRCs in the development of a written plan to meet standards;
- Traveling to any FRC requesting an in-person consultation;
- Assisting FRCs with completing the FRC-Q application;
- Reviewing FRC-Q applications for accuracy;
- Participating in the National Family Support Network through a membership with Family Support NH; and
- Providing FRCs with information and trainings on acquiring the FRC-Q designation.

As referenced in Exhibit A, Provisions to Standard Contract Provisions, Section 1.1., of the attached contract, the parties have the option to extend the agreement for up four (4) additional years, contingent upon satisfactory delivery of services, available funding, agreement of the parties and Governor and Council approval.

Should the Governor and Council not authorize this request FRCs throughout the state will not have the benefit of research-based frameworks of family support and subsequently lack resources to help families build on their own strengths and access to resources that are available in their communities to further their well-being.
